PRINCIPALLY SPEAKING - "And I Mean It!" --- Making your Word Gold

How many times have you heard a parent give an order to a child and then add, "Do you understand me?" Children can't wait to hear a parent talk like that because it means they have reached the end of their rope. The parent has once again reduced his or her authority through hollow, meaningless words.

This happens each time we make statements that can't be enforced- when we tell a child what to do or not do, than what we will do. In cases where parents frequently make unenforceable statements, children learn they do not have to do whatever the parent says or asks. Parental authority is undermined as children test the limits, act out and feel a general lack of control.

Some parents do not have

these problems because their word is gold. They understand that they actually have control over themselves and no one else. The art of making enforceable statements involves talking about ourselves and what we will allow, what we will do, or what we will provide. For example:

Unenforceable: "Don't talk to me like that!"

Enforceable: "I'll be glad to listen when your voice is as soft as mine."

Unenforceable: "Study NOW, young man!"

Enforceable: "Feel free to join us for some TV when you are finished."

Unenforceable: "Be nice to each other. Don't fight."

Enforceable: "You're both welcome to be around me when you're not fighting."

Unenforceable: "As long as

you live in this house, you won't be drinking alcoholic beverages."

Enforceable: "When I no longer have to worry about alcohol use, I'll let you use my car."

Parents who make only those statements which they can and do enforce, raise children who believe their parents mean what they say. Their children seldom test limits.

This technique needs practice. You might try, "Hey kids. From now on you need to know that I will be giving you dessert when you protect your teeth by brushing." It's much easier to withhold treats than to cram a toothbrush in a child's mouth!

Seven Keys to College Readiness

Key 1: Read at advanced levels in Grades K-2



Key 2: Score "advanced" in reading on the Maryland School Assessment in Gr. 3-8



Key 3: Complete advanced math in Grade 5



Key 4: Complete Algebra 1 by Grade 8 with a "C" or higher



Key 5: Complete Algebra 2 by Grade 11 with a "C" or higher



Key 6: Score 3 on an AP exam or 4 on an IB



Key 7: Score 1650 on the SAT or 24 on the ACT

In order for students to be highly successful students it is important for them to learn the skill of analysis. Analysis is key for students to be successful in the workforce and/or college. As students make their way up the seven keys, they will face many hurdles that will require them to analyze a problem or situation. By breaking things down (analysis), students can develop their potential for learning. Analysis will help students to learn to approach and solve new problems, so that they will have the capacity to solve problems in the future. Often students look at what is there and forget to break it down to see the parts. When students analyze they are going beyond what is and searching for the unknown. They are able to face a problem and have the tools to solve complex problems. Students will use the skill of analysis in all subject areas and facets of life.

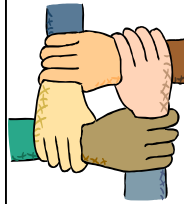


Instrumental Music

Math and Science Brief



As you walk through the halls and classrooms of Sequoyah, you may see blue bins with a familiar recycle icon. We see them more and more as we go from business to business. Our children are now growing up in an age where recycling is a part of what they do and not something that they have to “learn”. Below you will find some facts about recycling. Let’s help reduce our carbon imprint.

Think about:

Do you already use your recycle bins to the fullest at home?

If not:

Make a family focus to recycle bottles, cans and papers.

If yes:

Make a plan to conserve less energy by turning the lights off in unoccupied rooms, turning off the water when you brush your teeth, or keeping doors closed to conserve heat.

DID YOU KNOW?

Recycling Glass

Glass can be recycled virtually forever. It never wears out. For every 2,000 pounds of glass that is recycled, we save more than 2,000 pounds of other resources (1,330 pounds of sand, 433 pounds of soda ash, 433 pounds of limestone, and 151 pounds of feldspar.) Most bottles and jars that you use contain at least 25% recycled material. The energy saved by recycling just one bottle could light a 100-watt bulb for 4 hours.

Recycling Metals

Recycling an aluminum can saves 95% of the energy needed to make aluminum from bauxite ore. In the United States, the amount of steel that is discarded and not recycled every year is enough to build all the new American-made cars.

Recycling Plastic

Americans use 4 million plastic bottles every hour, but only 25% of plastic bottles are recycled.



Recycling Paper

75% of each tree that is cut down for paper is not used in a paper product. 98 tons of various resources are required to make one ton of paper. Paper made from recycled paper uses 70% less energy.

Math and science *is* the world around us.

Even in the above “Did you know” boxes you will find percentages, measurements in pounds, tons, hours, and watts. It is important for students to know $1 + 1 = 2$ or $3/4 = 75\%$, but it is even more important for students to make a connection from their world to the world of math and science. For example, I can memorize that 1 pound is 16 ounces. However, I have to stop and ask myself, so what does that mean? What does 1 pound look like? If I make a reference to something I already know, like a can of soup is about one pound, then I can continue building on from that point. As a parent you can help build reference points for your child. You may want your child to think about his or her weight and then compare it to what 2,000 pounds of glass might look like.

Even though we look at math and science as two different subjects, they actually fit hand in glove. As our children grow into adolescents and onto adults they need a strong math and science background. It is important for us to encourage children's curiosity of the world around them. Many times one question leads to why and then another why and so on. Turn the question around and ask them why do they think it happened or what do they think will happen, or how is this like something else you've experienced? Together we can build the foundation for future scientists and mathematicians.
